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Ambridge Area Hires New Superintendent

The Ambridge Area School District is pleased to announce and welcome Dr. Joseph Pasquerilla as the newly appointed Superintendent of Schools. Pasquerilla was hired at the School Board Meeting held on Wednesday, February 12, 2020. Dr. Pasquerilla will replace Joan Welter, who has served as superintendent at Ambridge since 2017.

Pasquerilla previously worked in the Ambridge School District as the Assistant to the Superintendent and The Director of Curriculum, Instruction and Assessment from 2009-2012.

Before returning to Ambridge, Pasquerilla served as the Superintendent of Schools for the Bethel Park School District, a position he has held since July 2016. Prior to that appointment, he worked as the Superintendent of the Northgate School District for 4 years.

He began his teaching career in the West Middlesex Area School District in 2003, where he taught High School Social Studies until 2008. Following, he was appointed Principal of Northway

PREPPING FOR AP EXAMS



The AP Calculus classes meet each week in Zoom to learn, go over problems, or review. The first couple of weeks AB and BC both met everyday - AB from 9-10 and BC from 10-11. AB learned the last topic we missed in March. BC had already learned all topics and were just practicing and reviewing. Now everyone is just reviewing. BC is now meeting 2 days a week and AB meets 3.



The students complete free response questions (FRQs) from AP Classroom independently, then we go over 1 or 2 of the problems in Zoom. Currently AB is also reviewing the AP Unit content for the 2020 At Home Exam through albert.io questions and we go over some of those in the Zooms.

AP Exams begin on May 11th, 2020.

CURBSIDE GRAB & GO LUNCHES

The Ambridge Area School District began their curbside grab n go lunch at three school sites in the district: The Senior High, State Street, and Economy Elementary. We have 15 food service staff rotating throughout the week to prepare fun yet nutritious packed lunches for the three sites. The utmost caution has been implemented amongst the team of workers. We prepare a cold meal consisting of the 5 meal components; soon we will mix in some favorite "hot" foods that are portable enough --or may just need reheated at home.

Parents are able to pick up kids meals --no one leaves their car! I'd like to say it's been quite a successful venture--we started out on Day One serving 77 lunches; now we are up to 260+ meals a day! It is our plan to keep our curbside meal service in place through a good bit of the summer, tentatively thru early August.





AASD is Remote, But Never Far Away

This week, the administration announced that we will be issuing bonus points for all students during the month of May. The administration wanted to institute a simple policy that would not negatively impact student grades, but encourage them to complete assignments. The teachers will be able to link assignment completion grading in the form of bonus points for the third nine-weeks. Below is an explaination on how the grading system will work.

- The ability for students to earn bonus points will begin on Monday, May 4, 2020. This will apply to all subject areas in the School District that issue an A through E letter grade.
- Students will have a chance to earn three bonus points per each completed assignment. These three bonus points will be added on to the total sum of the points earned in the third quarter. The

- bonus points will not be placed in the fourth quarter grade book.
- If a student completes all assignments for a given week, they will earn ten bonus points that will be added to the sum of the third quarter (A typical week has three assignments, so instead of nine bonus points being awarded, a student would receive ten bonus points).
- Teachers will keep track of student bonus points in a similar way as they are tracking student attendance at this time.
- The third nine weeks grade books will be reopened to add bonus points from May 25, 2020 to 3:00 PM on June 4, 2020.
- The last day for Senior grading will be May 29, 2020 and the last day for all other student grading will be June 3, 2020.

Ambridge Schools Receive Grant Money

The Ambridge Area School District is always actively seeking opportunities for grant money to enhance educational programs and district operations. District staff members are encouraged to seek out grants they can use in their classrooms and departments. During the 2019-2020 school year, the Ambridge Area School District received 14 distinct grants for various projects. Classroom teachers applied for seven grants to enhance educational opportunities with their students, the Middle School was awarded an anti-bullying grant from Highmark, and the district receives federal grants for programs like Pre-K and Title I.

The Technology Department, in collaboration with the Superintendent's Office, was awarded two grants this school year.

On January 17, 2020, Governor Tom Wolf announced \$5.7 million in PAsmart Targeted Grants will be distributed to schools across Pennsylvania to expand computer science classes and teacher training. Ambridge Area School District was awarded \$35,000 for computer science classes and teacher trainings in the elementary schools. Each elementary school will receive a new cart of iPads. Several staff members are involved in the extensive 6-day training sessions provided by PA Department of Education and PATTAN. We look forward

to this new opportunity to enrich the curriculum for our students.

Safety and security of our students is a top priority for the Ambridge Area School District. The second grant, focused on Safe Schools, and was awarded bv the Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency (PCCD). The \$40,000 grant is dedicated to upgrading our building card access system. Our new system integrates access control, IP video and intrusion into one common platform to deliver a centrally managed security solution. The new system will allow us to better monitor and manage This upgrade will cover all five schools: plus the Field House and Maintenance Garage.
