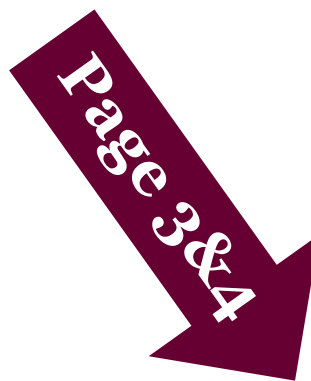
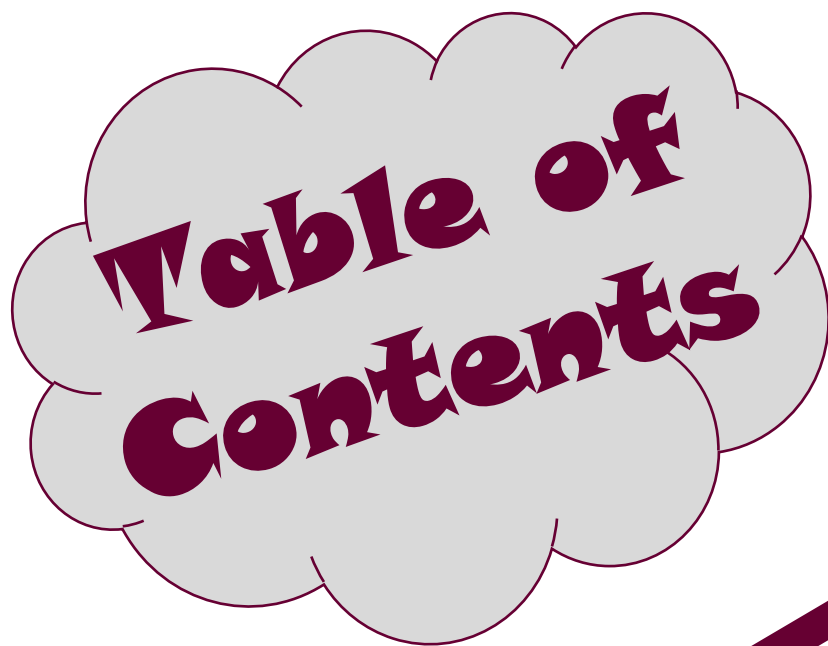

During the first Light Up Night, all lights downtown were switched on at exactly 6 p.m. as department stores revealed their

holiday displays. Light up night continues until this day each year. Many gather around and see the lights and enjoy the different decorations in market square. Sadly, this year with Covid-19 there was no Light Up Night and many things were cancelled. We must keep our holiday cheer and do as much as we can for the holidays. Holidays at these times can be difficult, especially because how different celebrating and everything will be. 5B: Nov. 28; WMUS 1A, 1B, 2A, 2F, 2G, 2H, 3A, 3B, 3C, 3D, 4C, 4E and 5B: Nov. 28; Sunday, Nov. 29; Nov. 30-Dec. 4. One antlered deer per hunting license year. (Paragraph 29) DEER REGULAR FIREARMS (Antlered and Antlerless) WMUS 1A, 1B, 2A, 2F, 2G, 2H, 3A, 3B, 3C, 3D, 4C, 4E and 5B: Dec. 5-12. One antlered deer per hunting license year. foundation of hunting in PA. White tail deer season is the most popular hunting season in PA. Thousands of residents partake in the seasons yearly. All hunters must remain lawful and respectful to all of the guidelines and regulations presented in the Hunters Guideline book given for the year. The caring place is a family-centered, child-focused program that offers peer support sessions for the whole family. These sessions are set up beforehand with the same 15-20 families with the same volunteers to establish a strong

sense of trust. They meet for about two hours every other week for about eight to ten weeks⁶. At the Caring Place you come to understand that you are not alone in this hard time and that there are others who really do understand. They provide a safe place for people to be able to open up and talk about how their feeling but no one is ever forced to do so. That is the beauty of it all, despite what you are going through or how you are dealing with it, there will always be someone there to catch you when you fall.

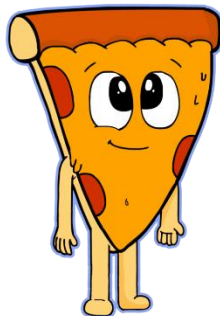
NO!

The Peanuts dance to that Christmas tune while Linus tells the story of the true meaning of

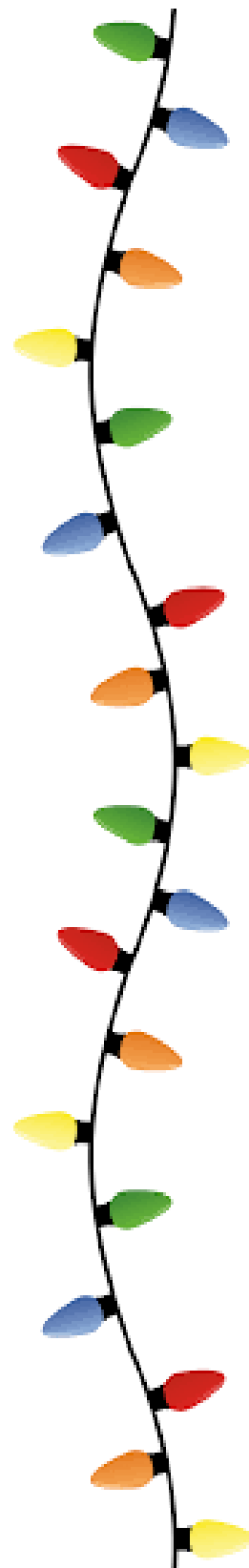

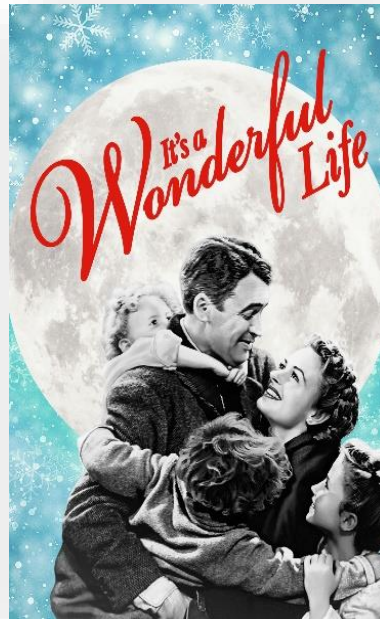

Stern was unsuccessfully trying to publish his short story, *The Greatest Gift*, when he got fed up and just sent out 200 copies to his close friends as a 21-page Christmas card. RKO pictures producer, David Hempstead, got his hands on this story and bought it for \$10,000! After selling it to Capra, he recruited Jimmy Stewart (born in Indiana, PA 😊) and Donna Reed as the lead roles.

Contrary to popular belief, *It's a Wonderful life*, didn't sell out theaters and make a ton of money, actually, quite the opposite. It put Capra \$525,000 in debt and left him scrambling to finance his next movie, *State of the Union*. Luckily, when the copyright ended in 1974, it became free to watch for anyone who desired. That of course ended in 1994.

In case you have yet to see this movie, and have no idea what I'm even talking about, here's a quick summary for you. Main character, George Bailey, has so many problems going on his life that he considers ending it all. As the angels

The New Year's Eve ball drop in Times Square has been something people from all over the world watch to kick off the New Year. Every year since its debut in 1907 the ball has dropped at midnight with a live audience to see. This year, like many things, New Year's Eve in Times Square is going to be different.

The History

New Year's Eve has been celebrated in Times Square since 1904, but the ball first made its appearance in 1907. Since then, the ball has changed considerably. First weighing around 700 pounds, the ball has gained about 11,175 pounds, bringing its total to 11,875 pounds. It not only grew in weight, but also in size. The Ball is now twelve feet in diameter, but on its first journey it was only five feet. The New Year's ball has 32,256 LED lights. Not only has the number of lights changed, but the type of light illuminating the Ball changed as well. In 1907 the Ball had only one hundred 25-watt light bulbs to light up Times Square.

New for 2020

Yes, the Ball is still going to drop this year. Sadly, this year's Times Square celebration will not be the same as years past. The plan for the 2020/2021 ball drop has been described as, "Virtually Enhanced, Visually Compelling and Very Different" by the organizers of Times Square's New Year's Eve.

Disastrous Snowstorms

Have you ever been in a snowstorm? Yes, they are sometimes cool looking, but they can be extremely dangerous if things get too out of hand. Most people do not realize just how dangerous they can be. In our lifetime there has never really been a huge blizzard or anything too crazy that we remember, but if look back in history, you will see some crazy events.

One of the worst blizzards in U.S. history was the Great Appalachian Storm of 1950. Starting on November 24, 22 states felt the wrath of

this slow-moving blizzard that the Washington Post called a "meteorological powerhouse." It's also been called the Great Thanksgiving Storm. The snowstorm covered an area from West Virginia to Pennsylvania, and buried parts in more than 30 inches of snow.

Several locations even received more than 50 inches of snow, and Coburn Creek, West Virginia, reported the greatest snowfall with a staggering 62 inches. High gusts of winds were recorded at 160 mph, so strong they knocked trees over, and caused almost 1 million power outages. It killed at least 383 people, caused about \$700 million of damage, and became a weather prediction case study. Two cyclone researchers said it was the "benchmark" storm that all other major 20th century storms could be compared to.

-storm is the Chicago Blizzard of 1967. On January 26 and 27, Chicago had its highest snowfall on record 23 inches, along with 53 mph wind gusts. The storm surprised the city, which had had warm temperatures only two days earlier. The snow was falling so fast and so heavy 50,000 cars were abandoned, shops were looted, and 650 students had to sleep at school because buses couldn't get through the snow. Overall, there were a total of twenty-six people that had died.

World Series 2020¹⁰

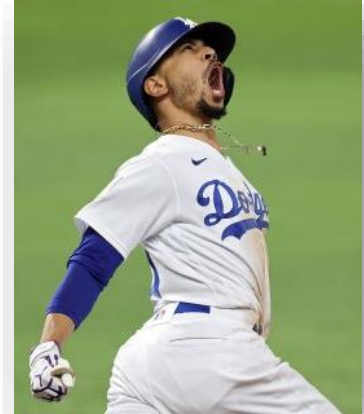

One crazy fact, the Dodgers now have seven world championships and the Lakers have 17, totaling in a grand 24 championships for the sports teams of LA. You're probably wondering, "Why is this significant?"

The reason is because 24 is the number of late NBA player, Kobe Bryant, who died in a helicopter crash with his daughter, Gianna, back in January. He was a huge part of all of Los Angeles and maybe this is a sign that he never left.
