allowed to stay home (...) If you got sick or anything, those days still counted against you. Looking back, as a teacher, I think it was a great idea and so many kids never missed school."

MY: "I played basketball and baseball."

PART II: HIGH SCHOOL IN THE 90S VS NOW

Now, taking a time machine back to the 90s, what was high school really like? Was it like the movies? And how does it compare to what we know as graduates of the early 2020s? The consensus among all three teachers, when asked if it was anything like the movies, is yes and no. "No," because when you had problems, they weren't solved by the end of the 90minute movie, it could take days or weeks. Another thing you see in movies is the courtyard for lunch, but that wasn't as big a thing as they make you believe. Football on the other hand, that was, especially at Ms. Simunick's high school. One thing Mr. Yannessa did point out is how much more freedom and less supervision there was back then which can be seen through those movies. Mr. Yannessa got his degree in history and education, then almost went for a masters in administration, but decided it wasn't what he wanted. Chinese New Year

Chinese New Year, the Spring Festival or Lunar New Year (traditional Chinese: 春節; simplified Chinese: 春节; pinyin: Chūn Jié), is the beginning of the new year on the traditional lunisolar Chinese calendar. A lunisolar calendar is based on exact astronomical observations of the sun's longitude and the Moon's phases. This year, the holiday that is considered most important in China, occurred on February 12th, 2021.

Some traditions are wearing new clothes and putting up new decorations (preferably red, wearing something new is symbol of removing old), feasting, and giving oranges or tangerines because "orange" sounds like "gold" in Cantonese, symbolizes wealth with tangerines symbolize good tidings as it sounds like "good luck" in Chinese. Another tradition is giving red packets to children called ang pao or ong bao with new money to pass on a year of good fortune and blessings. The tray of togetherness is

also served, an eight-compartment tray filled with candies because eight is a symbolic number in Chinese that represents prosperity, contains preserved kumquats for prosperity, red melon seeds for happiness, coconut for togetherness and sweets for a sweet and rich life for the coming year.

2021 is year of the ox (other recent years are 1949, 1961, 1973, 1985, 1997 and 2009). People born under the sign of the ox have an honest nature and are known for diligence, dependability, strength, and determination. These reflect traditional conservative characteristics. The Metal Ox (recent years being 1961 and 2021) have characteristics of being hardworking, active, always busy, and popular among friends. Some lucky colors for this year are white, yellow and green, while an unlucky color is blue. Lucky numbers are 1, 4 and numbers containing them, and unlucky numbers are 5, 6 and numbers containing those two.




National Cancer Prevention and American Heart Month

February is National Cancer Prevention Month and American Heart Month. This month is all about saving lives, an important job in the face of a pandemic that has claimed so many already.

February 4th was World Cancer Day, and the whole month of February is National Cancer Prevention Month. Cancer is the second leading cause of death in the US, today (CDC), with breast cancer being the most diagnosed type and lung cancer being the deadliest. Although the death rate from cancer has declined drastically due to new medical technologies, and is continuing to drop, around 606,520 people in the US still die from it each year. About 1,806,590 new cases are diagnosed in the US each year. Cancer is caused by many different factors, some are genetic, others are caused





by unhealthy behaviors like smoking, bad diets, and too much sun exposure. Some types of cancer, like liver cancer, can sometimes be caused by viruses or infections, as well as other things. Treatments for cancer depend on the type, and the individual infected. It is important to remember that cancer effects everyone in different ways. There are many different ways to donate to cancer prevention organizations. Some of the most popular charities are the American Institute for Cancer Research, American Cancer Society, and Stand Up to Cancer. All around the US there are fundraisers, walks, races, and more dedicated to raising money for cancer research and bringing awareness.

American Heart Month is about bringing awareness and informing people on the causes and dangers of heart diseases. Heart disease is the number one leading cause of death in the United States, with about 659,041 deaths per year, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. It can affect anyone at any age. The most common type of heart disease in the US is coronary artery disease, also known as CAD. CAD is the build up of plaque in arteries supplying blood to the heart, causing low blood flow. This can lead to heart failure, heart attacks, or death. Other common forms of heart disease include congenital heart defect, arrhythmia, dilated cardiomyopathy, and myocardial infarction (for more information on these diseases, and others, visit the link at the end of the article). Like cancer, some heart diseases are caused by genetics and cannot be prevented. These conditions need to be monitored and screened by doctors regularly. Other diseases are not caused by genes and can be prevented. Activities such as smoking and drinking high amounts of alcohol, as well as things like obesity and high stress/anxiety levels can cause some heart diseases. To help prevent these diseases, physical activity and eating a healthy diet are recommended.

There are many charities and non-profits out there dedicated to helping people who suffer from heart diseases. Some of those include the American Heart Association, Children's Heart Foundation, Kids with Heart, Women's Heart Foundation, and the American Red Cross. Along with these charities, there are fundraisers and awareness nights to inform people about these diseases, like Heart Walks. On Tuesday, February 16th during their game against the Washington Capitals, the Pittsburgh Penguins' coaches and announcement staff wore red ties and pins for Check Your Heart Night, a day dedicated to heart screenings.

It is no secret that Covid is still spreading rapidly. What does this mean for cancer and heart disease patients, though? For them, it means an even greater risk. Cancer patients are at a higher risk of becoming severely ill from the virus because of their weak immune systems. They are also more likely to contract Covid. It is because of this that many health care experts are recommending people with cancer to get the Covid vaccine as soon as possible, but only after talking to their doctors to make sure it is safe for them. Similarly to cancer patients, people who suffer from heart diseases are more likely to become severely ill after contracting the virus. Unlike people with cancer, though, in heart disease patients this is due to Covid damaging the respiratory system, making it harder for the heart to function properly. Both cancer and heart disease patients are at a higher risk of dying from the virus.

February is an important month for people who have cancer and heart disease, their friends, and their families. This year it is even more important to be safe and do everything possible to prevent contracting cancer and heart diseases.

NASCAR & The Daytona 500

NASCAR has been around for a while and is loved by many. It may just consist of mostly left turns, but there is more to it than that. NASCAR stands for National Association for stock car racing, and it was founded on February 21, 1948 by Bill France Senior. In the early years of NASCAR, competitors drove the same types of cars that people drove on the street – Buicks, Cadillacs, Oldsmobile's – among others with minimal modifications. Now they use Chevy, Ford, and Toyota, but they are highly modified, reaching around 750 Horsepower. The first ever race was held at Charlotte Speedway in South Carolina and the winner was Glenn Dunnaway. Later he was disqualified because he used illegal rear springs. After that, Jim Roper took the prize money home. In all there are a total of 24 racetracks, but a total of 38 races in each season. The reason for that being, some of the racetracks are turned into road courses for different races. The most important race of the year is Daytona. It is the first race of the year and one of the most intense races ever. Daytona is a 2.5-mile superspeedway that hosts multiple sporting events but is the center piece of NASCAR. This track also draws the attention of presidents occasionally like Trump last year. The NASCAR season kicks off at Daytona with speed weeks. Speed weeks consist of the clash, which is a race that only the best drivers compete in. Then there are the duels, which acts as the qualifier for the Daytona 500. The Daytona 500 is the season opener for NASCAR that has high speed patch racing that is always exciting because 1 wrong move at 200 mph can take half the field out of a race.






