#### Report on the progress made in attaining the goals of the wellness policy (REQUIRED):

The Wellness Committee met various times throughout the school year and have set these goals: Under Nutrition Education:

To enhance the level of Nutrition Education Opportunities for AASD staff members who are providing Nutrition Ed to our students.

Food Service Staff have implemented new ways to get the word out regarding nutrition education; we are placing nutrition related messages/ educational and fun materials- inside the curbside meal plastic bags.

**Nutrition Promotion:** 

To expand outreach to parents regarding topics of health and nutrition and to coordinate more with outsiders (the community). Examples of outreach currently in place are our dairy farmer visits and our Fresh Fruit and Veg Program Physical Activity:

Improve partnerships with the local YMCA to enhance awareness of the promotion of physical activity. Motivating our students to keep active.

Other School-Based Wellness Activities Section:
