In the spring of 2023, the 4th grade students at State Street Elementary announced the introduction of a pollinator garden. The garden is used to engage students in inquiry-based and hands-on learning in an outdoor classroom setting. Through this wonderful space, students benefit from exposure to a natural, outdoor learning environment and develop a curiosity for our natural world. Students learn to identify native plants and pollinators as well as their importance to our everyday lives.

Plants native to western Pennsylvania were selected based on spring, mid-summer, and fall bloom times for bees, birds, and butterflies to enjoy all growing season. Golden Alexander, Anise Hyssop, Wild Bergamot, and New England Aster are a few examples chosen for their nectar, while Rose (Swamp) Milkweed was chosen as a host plant for the amazing Monarch butterfly. Both eggs and caterpillars of the Monarch and Black Swallowtail butterflies were discovered in the garden this fall and brought into the traditional classroom to teach lessons on insect anatomy, life cycles, life span, habitats, migration, mimicry, and, of course, pollination. Students even tagged and registered the adult Monarchs prior to their release so to track their incredible migration to their over-wintering grounds in Mexico.

Seeds for annual plants were sown in the classroom during the winter months using a sophisticated lamp system. Students learned about germination, plant parts, life processes, photosynthesis, soil and light conditions, etc. as they observed and nurtured their Zinnias, Mexican Sunflower, and herbs. Once the steppingstones designed in art class with Mr. Frost were in place, the students transplanted the plants into the garden space. Finally, hard-working and dedicated students and parents volunteered for weekly maintenance over the summer months.

State Street's pollinator garden has provided invaluable lessons for our students and would not be possible without the support of Principal Hoover and the school's Parent Teacher Organization. In addition, donations from the school community, Elements Landscaping Management, and a grant from the Beekeepers of Beaver County contributed to the garden's success.

AS PART OF THE AWARD, MRS. DARROCH ATTENDED THE NSTA NATIONAL CONFERENCE OCTOBER 25–28 IN KANSAS CITY WHERE SHE LEARNED METHODS OF TEACHING USING PHENOMENON-BASED INVESTIGATIONS. THE ECONOMY ELEMENTARY STEAM PROGRAM RECEIVED A SCHOOL SCIENCE LAB MAKEOVER SUPPORT PACKAGE VALUED AT \$15,000. MRS. DARROCH WAS ABLE TO USE THIS MONEY TO PURCHASE SCIENCE FOR THE CLASSROOM KITS FROM THE SMITHSONIAN INSTITUTE. MRS. DARROCH NOW ADVANCES TO THE NATIONAL PHASE OF THE COMPETITION, IN WHICH SHE WILL HAVE A CHANCE TO WIN AN ADDITIONAL \$5,000 OF SUPPORT TO ATTEND A FUTURE NSTA NATIONAL CONFERENCE ON SCIENCE EDUCATION.

The Ambridge Area High School's Holiday Extravaganza By Madelyn Palmer



The Ambridge Area High School Guidance Department Would like to share information for additional supports for you and your student:

The Ambridge Area High School Guidance Department is committed to providing students with the additional support they need to succeed. As such, we would like to share some information with you on the resources that are available to both you and your student.

One such resource is our school counseling services. Our counseling team is dedicated to helping students improve their academic performance, as well as their social and emotional well-being. The team can provide academic guidance, social-emotional planning and help with post-secondary planning. The Counseling team is made up of professionals from various disciplines who work together to identify and address issues that may be hindering a student's success. They can provide support for issues such as drug and alcohol abuse, mental health concerns, and academic struggles. Additionally, we offer a variety of programs that range from counseling and community service organizations. The Psychology and Learning Center: 724-371-2000

The Psychology and Learning Center is a valuable resource for school students seeking individual counseling services during the school day. The Center collaborates with the Ambridge Area School District to provide individual counseling services to students who may need it. If you are interested in availing of these services, all you need to do is request a referral form from the High School Guidance Office. Alternatively, you can also call Vanessa Casper, the School Based Liaison at 724-371-2000. With the help of the Center's trained professionals, you can work towards overcoming any personal or academic challenges that you may be facing. Don't hesitate to reach out for assistance if you feel like you could benefit from these services.

Positive Steps Counseling With Western PA Psych Care: 724-266-2833, ext. 2223

Positive Steps Counseling Program is a resource available to students seeking help in getting behavioral, social or emotional concerns addressed. The program can be accessed by either making a referral through the school or by signing up directly. During the sessions, a primary therapist will be emphasizing on parent training in behavior modification strategies, psycho-education, community resource and care coordination, brief family therapy, and motivational enhancement strategies. Additionally, consultations with school staff are also conducted to address the child's concerns effectively. The consultations may involve the child's teachers, paraprofessionals, and school administration. The concerns that the program addresses include difficulty making friends or frequent complaints of bullying, school avoidance/refusal, frequent school disciplinary actions or truancy, frequent physical complaints, failing grades or frustration in completing school work, change in sleep/eating habits, behavior, or interests. The Student Assistance Program (SAP) is a process for identifying students who are experiencing barriers to their learning and success in school. SAP offers support to those students, and their families, to help them overcome these barriers. Behaviors that the Student Assistance Program can help with include but not limited to: Withdrawing from family or friends, No longer has the same friends, Depressed, Talking about suicide, Acting aggressive, Defying authority at school and home, Lying, Sudden drop in grades, Poor school attendance, and/or Experimenting with drugs or alcohol.

If your child is experiencing any of the above-mentioned behaviors or any other difficulties that are affecting their academic performance, the Student Assistance Program (SAP) is here to help. SAP is a confidential and voluntary program that provides support to students who are facing challenges that may be impacting their academic or personal life.

The SAP team is comprised of trained school and community staff who work together to identify and assist students who may be struggling. They can help connect your child with services that are available both in school and in the community, such as counseling, tutoring, and mentoring programs. The SAP team also works closely with families to provide guidance and support to help their children succeed.

It's important to note that SAP is not a disciplinary program, nor does it replace the role of parents or guardians in addressing their child's needs. Rather, it is a collaborative effort between school staff, families, and community resources to ensure that students receive the support and resources they need to overcome obstacles and reach their full potential.
